## **Morgan Brown**

Morgan has been a member of the Canadian Nuclear Society since he was a graduate engineer at Carleton University in 1987. He became actively involved with the Manitoba branch of the CNS in the 1990s, eventually becoming chair. The highlights were making classroom presentations and hosting a CNS information booth at The Forks in Winnipeg on Earth Day in April 1998. He won the 1998 CNS Education and Communication Award for these activities and for the beginnings of the nuclear history pages on the CNS web site.

Upon moving to Ontario in 2001, he joined the executive of the CNS Chalk River branch, and was chair for 2 years. In June 2003, he became the CNS webmaster, a position he holds today (2008). Amongst other things, he has added web pages and documents for Canadian nuclear history, CANDU performance, and CNS responses to media and other articles. He also attempts to increase the number of French pages on the site, better reflecting the bilingual nature of the Society.

Morgan has worked for Atomic Energy of Canada Limited, at the Whiteshell Laboratories (1989 – 2001) and Chalk River Laboratories (2001-present). His main work has been in CANDU reactor safety: fuel channel experiments, containment atmosphere behaviour experiments, and severe accident simulation/prediction with the MAAP4-CANDU computer code.

Morgan is married to Catharine Colotelo, and they live in Deep River, Ontario. They have two boys, which prompted Morgan into being a Scouting leader for the last ten years or so. Morgan is active in his church and enjoys bicycles (riding and fixing them). He is also passionate about railways (model and full-size), and believes that if God meant us to fly, He wouldn't have given us the railways (ok, so Flanders and Swann said it first).
